INNOVATION TO END HOMELESSNESS

After four years of research and investment, Wellspring launched our newest program, the Wellspring Employee Stability Program, in late 2023. Most families experiencing homelessness are employed, and most people who are employed are ineligible for government benefits. We designed this innovative program to meet the needs of families who are employed and struggling.

The free Wellspring Family Store continues to be a valuable and important service available to families in our community. It stands out as a celebrated program at Wellspring, boasting a remarkably low barrier for families to access the support they need. Last year the store saw an 18% surge in requests for essential items, marking a staggering 286% increase in demand since 2020.

For years the store has focused on providing essentials for children, from diapers and wipes to clothing and footwear. Moreover, it goes beyond the basics by offering items that aid parents in nurturing their children's development, including toys, games, and books. Additionally, families can rely on the store for hygiene products. The Wellspring Family Store is an invaluable lifeline for families, ensuring financial relief from having to purchase items that might otherwise be deemed low priority or unobtainable. Parents should never have to choose between clothing and rent, diapers, or food. Likewise, no child should go without toys, books or a warm winter coat. The store proudly assisted 2,353 families in 2023, thanks to the generous support of donors who gave new, and gently loved products, as well as financial support. Volunteers remain the driving force behind the store, ensuring Wellspring families receive the assistance they require when placing an order. The Family Store epitomizes community effort in its purest form!

As the 2023 chair of the Wellspring Associate Board (WAB), it has been my pleasure to witness our members grow and thrive. Both in number of members and in engagement. We have strived to create opportunities for our members to support the Wellspring mission to prevent and end the cycle of family homelessness.

In 2023, we added a significant number of new members, bringing a wealth of new perspectives and experiences to the Associate Board. Our members are driving new initiatives and processes through their individual interests and specialties. WAB members are particularly enthusiastic about volunteering with Wellspring and luckily have ample opportunities to do so! Dedicated members have established regular WAB presence at nearly every Wellspring event, including the Family Resource Fairs, Advocacy Day, cleaning the ELC playground, and the various Family Store volunteer days. For many of our members (myself included) these



opportunities are a valued physical manifestation of the effort and desire to "do good" in our communities.

In addition to supporting existing Wellspring initiatives including drives, fundraisers, and events, the WAB tries to find new and creative ways to support. "Change is Brewing" is a prime example of an idea born from WAB involvement. Partnering with various breweries in our community, the WAB hosts fundraising events on location raising individual donations while also receiving donations on a percentage of sales.

It's a fun event that goes beyond fundraising efforts and brings together Wellspring leaders and the community at large. This year was our most ambitious yet, doubling the number of events from a biannual occurrence to quarterly and raising over \$12,000 from this series alone.

For me, this past year as the chair was a wonderful experience. I've loved being part of, and witnessing, all the amazing work. My favorite experience is witnessing the transformation from initially conversing with a stranger about the WAB to later seeing them months down the line as a member, enthusiastically explaining the WAB to another curious stranger. I am so proud of our group and can't wait to see in which ways we'll grow in 2024!

Housing

There is no one solution that fits every family that walks through our doors. At Wellspring, our staff embrace this diversity and accompany each family on their journey towards stability. Below is a story shared by a Wellspring Case Manager, illustrating the varied and tailored support provided to every family.

In 2023



tenant education courses were offered to the community, and

families were redirected from shelters to housing.

l embarked on a journey with a resilient single mother facing the challenge of homelessness and desperately yearning to reunite with her two precious children. As her Case Manager, I knew that her success story would be one of determination. courage, and community support.

Our first encounter was filled with hope and desperation. With a heavy heart, she shared her story, emphasizing the desire to provide a stable home for her

children. The pivotal moment arrived when we successfully referred her to the King County Housing Authority family reunification program. Seeing her emotions as she received news of securing housing was unforgettable a mix of relief and anticipation for the road ahead.

The journey didn't end with securing housing; it was merely the foundation for what was to come. We recognized the importance of sustainable employment for her long-term stability. Connecting her to the Eastside Employment program through YMCA was a crucial

step. It was heartening to witness her growth, as she gained new skills and ultimately secured a job that not only brought financial security but also a renewed sense of purpose.

The real triumph came when the mother. through sheer determination, regained custody of her children. Their tearful reunion was a testament to the power of resilience and community support.

Acknowledging the significance of her personal growth, she graduated from mandated parenting classes, reflecting her commitment to creating a nurturing and supportive environment for her family. To further strengthen her family bonds, I referred her to family counseling support. The sessions became a safe space for them to communicate, understand each other's needs, and build a foundation of love and trust.

> To further enhance their overall well-being, I assisted

in finding a primary family doctor for the family. Access to healthcare became a cornerstone in ensuring the family's physical and emotional health. This step emphasized our holistic approach to their journey, addressing not only immediate needs but also fostering long-term well-being.

Over the next six months, my role shifted to providing coaching and assistance, navigating challenges, including rental subsidies that gradually empowered her to take over her entire rent payment. Through this process, she blossomed into a selfsufficient, stable mother who was not only providing a home for her children but embodying the strength of a transformed life.

Being a part of her journey from homelessness to stability was an honor. It reinforced the importance of compassionate, community-driven interventions and the incredible impact we can make when uniting to uplift those in need. This success story isn't just about one individual; it's a testament to the power of support, resilience, and the transformative journey that unfolds when a community rallies behind someone determined to rewrite their story.

Early Learning Center

We firmly believe every child deserves a childhood full of joy, exploration, and the chance to thrive. Our Early Learning Center (ELC) provides a safe, nurturing space where children facing trauma and homelessness are free to be kids, while preparing for their bright futures. Our culturally responsive approach prioritizes trauma-informed care and supports children holistically as they improve foundational developmental skills, build trusting relationships, and prepare for success in kindergarten and life.

Every experience during early childhood matters. Children learn and develop resilience for life when their experiences are consistent, emotionally supportive, and developmentally appropriate. However, for children who continuously face trauma and instability, a lack of adequate early support may hinder their ability to achieve success in academic and social environments, starting as early as kindergarten.

In 2023, only 31.9% of children experiencing homelessness in Washington State entered school ready for kindergarten, in stark contrast to 53.1% of housed children. Wellspring's ELC provides a nurturing environment focused on trauma-informed care. By prioritizing emotional support and developmental growth, we help children build the foundation they need to succeed. In 2023, 92% of the children attending Wellspring's ELC gained at least ten new developmental skills during their stay in the program.

Our commitment to the children in the ELC goes beyond academics. Trauma challenges people's idea that the world is a safe place, fostering feelings of insecurity and mistrust. To begin to heal, families need to feel secure. For children, primary caregivers frequently provide this sense of safety. However, when the whole family has been impacted by trauma, children may need support from others. ELC classrooms are safe spaces where children can heal, flourish, and be supported by dedicated staff who receive specialized training to address the unique needs of children with trauma histories.

Along with specialized training, the ELC upholds a no-expulsion policy and intentionally low student-to-teacher ratios, ensuring the support students deserve. In our toddler-age classrooms, there is one teacher for every four students, while classrooms catering to older children maintain a ratio of one teacher for every five students. Rather than resorting to expulsion if challenging behaviors arise, we have integrated an Infant Early Childhood Mental Health Therapist into the ELC team to collaborate with both children and teachers to address issues in real-time. This practice purposefully disrupts the "school-to-prison pipeline" that has historically pushed youth of color out of schools and into the criminal justice system.

In helping children meet their basic survival needs and begin to heal from homelessness, teachers support the children to feel free to be kids. For instance, they prioritize play-based learning activities to cultivate creativity, imagination, and social interaction. There is also emphasis placed on building trusting relationships between children, caregivers, and peers to foster a sense of connective belonging. All practices are highly inclusive and flexible to accommodate diverse learning styles and abilities, ensuring that every child feels valued.

In essence, the ELC celebrates the unique strengths, interests, and talents of each child, creating a supportive environment where they can explore their passions and express themselves freely. students graduated ready for Kindergarten.

In 2023, the Wellspring EAP was offered by 250+ employers to approximately 100,000 employees in Washington State and beyond. We introduced a new small group product for employers with fewer than 50 employees and we continued to build out our Learning & Development offerings which have been well received by our customers.

The Employee Stability Program (ESP) is ready for participants! In late 2023 we began offering bi-monthly webinars for employers and benefit brokers to learn about this new program which offers financial coaching and referral services to employees experiencing financial instability.
